How can you minimize these risks?

- Create an internal policy on the types of websites your employees can visit.
- Educate employees on password security. For example, employees shouldn't enable social sites to 'remember' passwords or allow for automatic sign-in.
- Educate employees on what constitutes 'sensitive' information and create a policy that is in line with your company's culture.

## Interview: Managed Services

Here at Agility, we never miss an opportunity to have a little fun. We thought it'd be pretty exciting to do a quick interview with our very own Managed Services Guru, Matt Bartels, so we could share his knowledge and insight with the rest of the world. *Interviewed by Carson Denny.*

**CD:** So, I heard something at a marketing conference about Managed Services and I've been wanting to ask you about it, a lot of people seemed shocked.

**MB:** Do tell! There are certainly some things that might seem counter-intuitive, but they really make sense when you look at the big picture.

**CD:** During a roundtable, a panelist said "Managed Services \*doesn't\* prevent computer problems from happening." I thought that is precisely what Managed Services is about. Haven't we always been told that Management is about preventing problems?

**MB:** That's a good question, and underneath it is an important concept to grasp. "Anything that can go wrong, will go wrong". Anyone who says they can get around that is either deluded or lying. Managed Services cannot stop lightning, theft, or user errors. Problems are still going to happen, and systems are still going to be affected. The difference is this: in a Managed environment, you \*do\* prevent those problems that \*are\* preventable, and you predict and plan for those that you know you cannot stop. It's taking a step back from the trees to see the forest – instead of trying to create an unbreakable system, you create a resilient system that doesn't break easily, and is quickly fixed when the unexpected happens.

**CD:** What's a predictable problem?

**MB:** A great example is workstation backups. Workstations do not have the inherent robustness of a server; especially some of the new types coming into play such as tablets. So rather than trying to add weight, power, and cost by only using a more robust \*device\* we reduce the risk of data loss, and downtime by setting up a system that allows a user to be restored and working quickly when their device fails. For a laptop this can be no more difficult than running a weekly backup of the laptop hard drive – that way, if the laptop is lost, stolen, or destroyed, we can simply restore the user's environment to the exact state it was in as of the last backup. That way minimal work is lost, and the user isn't stuck "reconfiguring" everything back to the way it was for the next week.

**CD:** That sounds like a costly proposition!

**MB:** Actually, for any managed Agility client, the software tools are already included in their management agreement, and we have the experience to get the backup components set up quickly and affordably. Usually the only additional cost is for a storage drive to hold the backups!

**CD:** What would you say is the major advantage to a Managed Environment, even in the face of unpredictable and unavoidable failures?

**MB:** The advantage is, in short, "Reduction of Risk." Through

many areas. But remember, having clearly defined policies that your employees will embrace in order to create an 'aware and secure' culture, will help your business go a much longer way.

our knowledge of the kinds of problems business IT systems have, we can plan for them, and have a prepared response when they do happen. And, because of the Management toolset we are using, we can identify the failure quickly and start the response plan in a very timely fashion – often before the users of the affected system are fully aware of the failure!
